

WYNNUM State School has continued its good form on the rugby league field, this time at the Brisbane Rugby League Metropolitan Cup

After dominating Wynn-um District Patron's Trophy Finals, where it won three of the four divisions, Wynnum State School progressed to the knockout Metro Cup competition which culmi-nated in grand finals at Sun-corp Stadium.

The school's under-nine team was beaten on the fulltime hooter in the quarter-finals by the premiers.

The under-12s were beaten in the semi-finals, also by the eventual premiers. The Wynnum under-10s

progressed to the grand final for the second year in a row (as under-nines last year) and faced the same team from Kruger State School (Ipswich) that beat them in last year's decider. Against the much larger

opposition, the Wynnum boys put in a brave effort but were again defeated.

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
